FOR BETTY Nance Smith, art is a celebration of life. Over the years, her painting has evolved from a talent worth exploring to a gift worth sharing with others. Thus, Smith says, if she can make a viewer half as happy as she was when creating the artwork, her gifts have been well-used. She enjoys working in all genres but does have a few favorite subjects, including portraits of children, seascapes, flowers from her bountiful gardens, and young people in settings that conjure up stories in her mind. Whether it's a vase brimming with lavender asters or young costumed models, Smith prefers to paint from life. From time to time she also uses various reference tools, such as small oil studies and photographs.
